Charter applicants must establish a community before opening their school and new schools must do outreach in their communities to attract students.

# **Enrollment of Students with Special Needs**

enrolled in network schools have special needs.

English Language Learners make up 7.7% of enrolled students in independent charter schools. While this is considerably less than 14% of students in enrolled in district schools, charters can and often do set enrollment preferences for ELLs for their admissions lottery and waiting list.

English Language Learners and NYC Charter Schools

- ELLs in charter schools are more likely to attain proficiency in English and become "former ELLs" at a faster rather than their district counterparts.
- Overall, a larger portixon of ELLs in NYC charter schools score at the Proficient level on the NYSESLAT than in traditional district schools.
- ELLs in charter schools score proficient in Math and English Language Arts at higher raters than citywide averages, althugh there is still much room for improvement.

# **Students with Special Needs** and NYC Charter Schools

- NYC charter schools' students with special needs score proficient in Math and English Language Arts (ELA) at higher rates than city wide averages.
- Students with special needs in charter schools are more likely than their district peers to be declassified from special education and move into less restrictive settings.
